### **18. Course Description:**

This course is a continuation of study of oral pathology of oral mucosa, dental tissues and related structures.

Students learn about the pathogenesis, aetiology, histopathological features and diagnostic methods of a range of lesions of the oral mucosa and jawbones, including white lesions, infections, ulcers, salivary gland disease, odontogenic tumors, bone disorders and oral manifestations of systemic diseases.

### 19. Course aims and outcomes:

#### A- Aims:

This course is aiming to provide the students with knowledge about common oral lesions of the oral and peri-oral regions that might be encountered during practice of dentistry and how to deal with such oral pathologies in terms of diagnosis and management.

**B- Intended Learning Outcomes (ILOs):** Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Recognize normal oral anatomy and variations of normal.
- 2. Relate oral pathology to other dental sciences.
- 3. Distinguish features of common oral diseases that help in its clinical diagnosis.
- 4. Generate a differential diagnosis for common oral lesions or diseases.
- 5. Explain the pathogenesis and etiological factors of various oral diseases.
- 6. Connect histopathological features of oral lesions to its clinical presentation and management.
- 7. Demonstrate the skills of analytical problem solving, investigation, and self-development in the field of oral pathology.

# 22. Teaching Methods and Assignments:

- 3- **Assignments**: consisting of literature search looking for answers for questions raised in lectures and discussing it in Moodle forums and lectures.

### 23. Evaluation Methods and Course Requirements:

Opportunities to demonstrate achievement of the ILOs are provided through the following <u>assessment</u> <u>methods and requirements</u>:

- 1. **Midterm exam** (MCQs or essays), **e-learning discussions**: 40 points.
